Microtwinnings

Greetings!

This is our second Newsletter, 5 months into the project. We were not able to meet in person since the beginning of the grant, but we feel like a team, already having quite concrete achievements in Traincrease.

We are nearing the end of the first phase of the project, which focused on Theory Building. Our theoretical views on abstraction were refreshed and sometimes challenged due to the March Rome Symposium. We summarized the challenges and novel ideas in a report, submitted as our first main deliverable of the project. The Symposium was also an inspiration for a special issue proposal that Anna Borghi sent to Philosophical Transactions B. Some ideas for theory development were put immediately to realization in 9 small projects—Microtwinnings—accepted after the call. Thank you, Anna, and your Team at the Roma La Sapienza, for your leadership in this part of Traincrease!

Now is the time for transition to the second stage of the Project, focused on research methodology, under the guidance of the University of Manchester Team, led by Angelo Cangelosi and Thea Cameron-Faulkner. We will develop skills in Experimental Semiotics, Experimental Psychology, Movement Analysis, and Computational Modeling and Robotics – all as applied to research on abstraction. The first workshop, "Cultural evolution in the laboratory: how to experimentally investigate the emergence of abstract concepts", will take place at the Interacting Minds Centre, Aarhus University. Due to the pandemic, we had to postpone the date (to 28-29 Oct 2021) but this way there is a fair chance it will be a face-to-face meeting! We are very much looking forward to this.

NEW/FRESH PERSPECTIVES ON ABSTRACT CONCEPTS SYMPOSIUM

Rome Symposium was the focal point of our efforts in March. We've managed to secure the array of keynotes who are at the forefront of research on abstraction or on theoretical frameworks which may lead to important changes in perspective.

The first day of the conference has been viewed over 1000 times on YouTube, with the next days approaching this number. Both the number and the engagement of participants have far exceeded our expectations.

Each day concluded with the debate between the Twinning Partners and the Keynotes, which was most helpful for identifying the theory building and research challenges. A more detailed description may be found in the section *Report*, summarizing the challenges.

The Symposium was an important meeting of people across disciplines (from philosophy to psychology to linguistics to anthropology to robotics), and across approaches (information processing, ecological, enactive frameworks) over the topic of the role of social interaction in abstraction and vice-versa. Report

The Symposium and Partner's discussions stemming from it revealed many key challenges in the study of abstract concepts and words. The role of social interaction for abstraction and the function of abstract concepts and words within social interactions seemed indeed to be a novel perspective. It allowed for an insightful systematization of the questions and deciding on research priorities.

Starting from the very definition of concepts and abstractness, the interactive perspective emphasizes and the primacy of action and co-action. This reveals new sources for the stabilization and flexibility of concepts and their underlying categories. Thinking about features and concepts as relational and processual seemed to alleviate some of the conundrums.

The social-interactive perspective also allowed for a broader look and deeper appreciation of the role of language, through which the collective input necessary in the case of abstract concepts can be realized. Last but not least, the aspects of inner grounding—in felt motion, emotions, and other experiences—were discussed, as well as ways that social interactions and relations may influence them.

Conclusions from these discussions were gathered in a report (*Document Summarizing the Challenges*) and uploaded as a deliverable of the project. It is also our Milestone in the project development, orienting us in our future actions. We identified areas of research for the Microtwinning projects, crucial for developing this area of research. They were published as *Call for Microtwinnings*: small collaborative cross-institutional projects, involving ESRs from Warsaw University in collaboration with world-class experts.
